REV. BILLY JOE ROOK

October 2, 1934-April 6, 2017

Reverend Bill Rook, 82 of Greensboro, loving and devoted husband, father and grandfather passed away Thursday evening, April 6, 2017. Born October 2, 1934 in High Point he is a son of the late Jule Rook and Fannie Mae Siegler Rook Rev. Rook pastored multiple churches in several states including two churches in the High Point area.

He left behind his wife, Laverne Rook of the home and children that he loved dearly, BJ Rook, Jr and wife Michele of Franklin, TN and Jennifer May and husband Scott of Beaufort, SC and five grandchildren.

His son-in-law, Scott writes:

I can't tell you how much I admired my father-in-law, Bill Rook He was the most gentle, giving man I have ever met. I first met him and Laverne in probably 1995. To me it was a much different lifestyle, no TV and just sitting around in silence until someone spoke what might be on their mind. Then it was, "What are we going to eat, and where are we going?" Over the years I would sit back while they were with us or we were with them and think about how much they loved each other and especially how much they loved the Lord. I wasn't brought up like this and it was all so different. I respect, admire and love the man who is my father-in-law. He would always have a funny joke or a funny story. It always seemed like he was so happy to see his little girl and his grandkids when we would pull up in the drive way. He would always be waiting. I watched him take care of Laverne no matter how tired he might be. I often thought, how can you keep doing it? In my eyes he was an angel in human flesh. He is now an angel with no pain and God's loving arms around him.

Rev. Rook and his wife, Laverne, were much loved in the local congregation of Archdale, North Carolina. Bro. Rook transferred his credentials to the Pilgrim Holiness Church Conference in the summer of 2015. Physical limitations in both his wife and himself kept Bro. Rook from ministering from the pulpit very much, but his radiant testimonies from the pew were a constant source of God's blessing in our services. When Rev. Rook knew he had but days left in this life, his pastor, Derald Hunt, asked, "Bro. Rook, is there anything you would like to share with me that you might want to send back to the church family?" He quickly replied with conviction, "Well, nothing has changed since January 15, 1953 when I started this way. I've had some blunders along the way, the Lord knows about those things, but nothing's changed." Bro. Rook kept a consistent trajectory of service from start to finish, and could confidently claim with the Apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

MINUTES OF THE 97TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

SESSION 1 – Monday, July 9, 2018 – 7:00 P.M.

1. President John A Peabody, Jr. called the Ninety-Seventh Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, to order at 7:00 p.m. in the tabernacle at Victory Grove Camp Ground. Rev. Perry Case opened with prayer. Rev. Joel Byer led the congregational hymn, “My Saviour’s Love.” Prayer requests were shared. Rev. Dale Sherman led a season of congregational prayer.
2. Vice-President, Rev. Terry Newman presented a devotional, “The Good Part.”
3. The Secretary called the roll of ordained ministers, licensed ministers, delegates and lay delegates.
4. President Peabody named tellers for handling the microphones and ballots. Tellers announced were Jason Damin, William Miller, Joshua Withe, Erik Samborski, Michael Johnson, Tonweya Sherman, John Musser Jr. & Michael Musser.
5. In behalf of the Reception Committee, Erik Samborski introduced Carol Williams, Stephen Lambeth, & Trevor Mills. Each shared a personal testimony and afterwards were greeted with a hand shake by the Conference body.
6. A motion was adopted to grant the guests an honorary seat within the Conference bar. Motion approved.
7. Vice President, Rev. Terry Newman read letters from Rev. Paul Pierpoint and Charles Heckman sending their greetings.
8. President Peabody presented Rev. Timothy Montgomery with a plaque for years of service as Conf. Office Editor and Secretary.
9. Vice President, Terry Newman gave his report on his activities in behalf of the Conference. A motion to receive this report was adopted.
10. Vice President, Terry Newman read the following Auditor’s Report:
 - a. Adirondack Camp was read. A motion to receive it was adopted.
 - b. Binghamton Camp was read. A motion to receive it was adopted.
 - c. Victory Grove Camp was read. A motion to receive it was adopted.
11. Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Merle Hock gave his report. His report was adopted.
12. Joe McManaman from Holiness Advancement Foundation shared an update of what is happening. He shared of many ways the Foundation is assisting to those who need it.
13. Rev. Joel Byer, Conf. Youth President’s Report gave his report of his activities this past year. His report was adopted.
14. Rev. Daniel Shumway gave a Trustees’ Report. He referred to the 2017 Minutes pg. 42. His report was adopted.
 - a. The Ogdensburg property is under contract to be sold upon approval of the Attorney General.
 - b. The Windsor Church and Parsonage is sold
 - c. The Franklin Ave. property at Binghamton Camp is sold
 - d. The Beatrice and Anna Mae Dodge properties have reverted back to Binghamton Camp.
 - e. The Endicott Church and Parsonage lease contract has expired.
 - f. The Lisbon Parsonage has been taken off the market.
15. Jason Morford, Conf. Youth Treasurer gave his report. His report was adopted.
16. Jason Morford, Conf. Statistician gave his report. His report was adopted.
17. Sr. Patricia Davis, Secretary of Memorial Committee gave her report. Memorials of

Rev Lawrence Burcaw and Rev. Billy Joe Rook was read. Her report was adopted.

18. President Peabody shared to the Conference body about the Sayre Church (PA). The local church board (membership) made the decision to sell the church, parsonage and property. He shared a little history of the Sayre Church. Over \$9K was donated to Binghamton Camp. Over \$200K donated to Tunkhannock school.
19. President Peabody shared that Rev. Daniel Heckman (absent) will receive a plague from the Conference for 30 years of service.
20. Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. Kenneth Sickler gave his missions report and his activities. He shared reports from Haiti, Brazil, & Winnipeg. His report was adopted.
21. President Peabody shared with the Conference body about the work and the ministry in Rome, NY, where Erik Samborski is currently pastoring. God's Missionary President, Rev. Jacob Martin, Rev. Jeremy Fuller, Conf. President Peabody and Rev. Terry Newman met in Middleburg, PA. The Council voted unanimously to work in cooperation with God's Missionary Church. November 1, 2017, Erik Samborski moved to Rome, NY. President Peabody than paused to allow Rev. Terry Newman to give his report.
22. Rev. Terry Newman, gave his Church Extension Coordinator's report. His report was adopted.
23. Erik Samborski, who is pastoring in Rome, NY, shared the message & vision of what the Lord has laid on his heart.
24. A motion was entertained to extend the session so Erik Samborski could continue to share his challenging message (currently 10:06pm). Motion was approved.
25. A motion was made to recess at 10:25pm. Motion Approved.

SESSION 2 - Tuesday July 10, 2018 - 9:00 am

1. President Peabody opened the session (9:14 AM). Rev. Alvin Downs led the hymn, "A Charge To Keep I Have." Rev. David Walter led the congregation in a season of prayer.
2. Motion was adopted to refer the reading and approval of the minutes of the previous session to the Council.
3. The Roll Call was updated.
4. President Peabody invited the Conference body to an open house to see the work done at the parsonage from 12 noon to 2 pm.
5. Tellers were updated.
6. President Peabody gave an update on the Howard Church. The church has voted the 2nd time to withdraw from the Conference and is no longer with us. There were 15 members on the roll, 8 were present in the meeting. The vote was 7 yes and 1 no. 4 of their membership have transferred to other Pilgrim churches.
7. The Secretary of the Receptions Committee, Erik Samborski, introduced Sean English to the Conference body. Sean shared a testimony. He is a Senior at UBC. He is currently filling in at the Kingston, Ontario PHC for the summer.
8. A motion was adopted to grant Sean English an honorary seat within the Conference bar.
9. Conference President gave his report. He reported his activities on behalf of the Conference and shared several positive highlights that have occurred throughout the Conference. A motion was made to receive his report and adopted with a rising vote of approval.

10. Treasurer Charles Whitney presented a printed copy of the Annual Conference Financial Statement (handed out the night before) with his report of highlights and concerns. Motion was adopted to receive his report.
11. A summary of the Conference Auditor's report was read. A motion to receive it was adopted.
12. The Examining Board (Rev. James Davis) recommends a first year Minister's License for Carol Williams, Trevor Mills, & Stephen Lambeth. Upon the recommendation of the Examining Board and the review of the Conference Council, the Council recommends and finds Carol Williams, Trevor Mills, & Stephen Lambeth ready for first year license. A vote was taken with ballots counted on the side. They all were Approved.
13. The Examining Board recommended Charles Colton's Ministerial license be reinstated. Upon the recommendation of the Examining Board and the review of the Conference Council, the Council recommended Charles Colton's Ministerial License be reinstated. A vote was taken with ballots counted on the side. He was Approved.
14. The Examining Board recommended the renewal of Conference License for William Miller, Josh Withe, Charles Heckman, Erik Samborski, and Tonweya Sherman. Upon the recommendation of the Examining Board and the review of the Conference Council, the Council recommended William Miller, Joshua Withe, Charles Heckman, Erik Samborski, and Tonweya Sherman for renewal of Conference license. A vote was taken with ballots counted on the side. They all were Approved.
15. Session recessed at 10:35 for a brief break. Reconvened at 10:44.
16. President Peabody recognized Sr. Wanda Babcock in attendance and she shared her greetings to the conference body.
17. The Polity Committee proposed the following change; the position of Conference Missionary Secretary be expanded and changed into the position of full time Conference Missions Director.
18. There was a lengthy discussion concerning this proposal.
19. Motion was made to vote on this position (Missions Director) annually. The proposal died because it failed to get a second.
20. Mr. Charles Whitney shared with the Conference body concerning the finances of the new proposed position.
21. Motion was made to extend the time of session. Motion approved.
22. Vote by secret ballot on the Missions Director proposal. Due to discrepancy of ballots count, a motion was made to do a recount of the ballots. Recount results, 44 Yes, 23 No. Proposal failed due to lack of 2/3 requirement.
23. Motion was adopted to reconvene at 1:30 pm.
24. Motion to recess for lunch was adopted at 12:23 pm.

SESSION 3 - Tuesday, July 10, 2018 - 1:35 pm.

1. President Peabody opened the session with a chorus and asked Rev. Michael Johnson to lead the congregation in prayer.
2. Motion was adopted to refer the reading and approval of the minutes of the previous session to the Council.
3. Examining Board reported that all Ministerial reports, except for a few retired ministers in failing health were received and were satisfactory. Report approved as read.
4. Ways and Means Committee reported. The Proposed Lindsey Fund Resolution.
Whereas, the Lindsey Fund, to date, has been treated as an 'endowment fund' -

where only interest earned is available for use while the principle remains constant. And whereas, this limitation was imposed internally upon the receipt of the funds, and not an expressed restriction by the granters, be it

Resolved, That an amount (consisting of interest earned and principle) equivalent to 7.5% of the prior year-end Fund's balance, with a \$10,000 minimum, be transferred each year to the Foreign Missions' account until the Fund is depleted.

This motion passed as an Annual Resolution

5. Resolution Committee reported the following:

- a. Ministerial Convention 2020 be cancelled to attend Bus Convention Lebanon, PA. Amend proposal, by remove **“and their wives”** Amendment approved. A voice vote was taken and this resolution passed. **(Refer to Resolution proposal #1.)**

Proposal - Whereas most years the annual Outreach and Bus Convention and our Ministerial Convention take place during the same month, and many of our ministers, are bi-vocational. There is great difficulty in getting the time off and/or being able to afford to take the time off; **Be it resolved** that a one-time change be made in the Conference Calendar and in the year 2020 our Conference Ministerial Convention be cancelled and all our ministers be required to attend the annual Outreach and Bus Convention to be held in Lebanon, Pa. Our conference Ministerial Convention would then resume in March 2021.

- b. New Yorker's Family Research Foundation be given a place on the New York Pilgrim Holiness Church calendar by moving Ministerial to a more workable time slot. A standing vote was taken and this resolution failed. **(Refer to Resolution proposal #2.)**

Proposal - Whereas 21 of our 38 churches are located in NY state, whereas NY Legislators Day is consistently the 3rd Tuesday in March, Ministerial also being scheduled at, or near that time, Bus and Outreach Convention schedule near that time as well. Many of our pastors (being bi-vocational) are unable to get time off for all of these events. Whereas NY Legislators Day has no Holiness denomination currently involved and standing up to the liberal NY agenda during this time, this being one day when we can stand shoulder to shoulder with other groups of common beliefs - **Be it resolved** that the conference consider New Yorker's Family Research Foundation (aka, New Yorkers for Constitutional Freedom) be given a place on the New York Pilgrim Holiness Churches calendar by moving the Ministerial to a more workable time slot so as to enable to encourage, inform and participate with our ministries and our constituents the Legislators Day.

- c. The joint effort between our Conference and God's Missionary Conference concerning the work in Rome, NY be ratified. A motion was made to add the words after “church”, **“as long as the minister is a NY Pilgrim pastor”** Amendment approved. A voice vote was taken and this resolution passed. **(Refer to Resolution proposal #3.)**

Proposal - that the conference body would ratify the council decision on behalf of the New York Pilgrim Holiness Conference to work together with the God's Missionary Conference on a new church plant in Rome, NY and the authorization of a \$10,000.00 salary paid over the period of 10 months to the New York Pilgrim minister pastoring said church; **Be it resolved** that the conference actions

are ratified by the conference body concerning the new joint effort church plant between the God's Missionary Conference and the New York Pilgrim Holiness Church and the salary to be paid to the minister of said church as long as the minister is a NY Pilgrim pastor for the time and amount agreed to previously by the Council under the condition of further explanation of current and future plans for said work.

- d. The Resolutions Committee moved that the Annual Resolution in the 2017 Minutes pg. 29, #5, be adopted as Standing Resolution. Resolution passed.
 - e. The Resolutions Committee moved that the Annual Resolution in the 2017 Minutes pg. 29, #2, be adopted as Standing Resolution. Resolution passed.
 - f. The Resolutions Committee moved that the Annual Resolution in the 2017 Minutes pg. 29, #3, be adopted as Standing Resolution. Resolution passed.
 - g. The Resolutions Committee moved that the Annual Resolution in the 2017 Minutes pg. 29, #4, be adopted as Standing Resolution. Resolution passed.
 - h. Resolutions Committee moved that the Annual Resolution in the 2017 Minutes pg. 30, #6, be adopted as Standing Resolution. Resolution passed.
 - i. A motion was made to require the Council to seek legal advice concerning the 2017 Minutes pg. 29, #5. This motion was passed.
6. Motion was made to recess for a 5 minute break. Motion approved.
 7. Reconvened at 2:55 pm.
 8. Rev. Derald Hunt shared with the Conference body his perspective concerning the failure of the Missions Director's proposal.
 9. Prior to holding elections, President Peabody read qualifications for officers from the Discipline. Following are the results of the elections:
 - Rev. Terry Newman was elected Vice President, 2nd vote (48/62).
 - Rev. Jonathan Fall was elected Secretary, 2nd vote (49/63).
 - Mr. Charles Whitney was elected Treasurer, 1st vote (53/58)
 - Rev. Kenneth Sickler was elected Missionary Secretary, 3rd vote (42/63).
 10. Ballots were cast for Advisory members to the Council. They are as follows:
 - a. Rev. Joel Byer - 1st vote (47/63)
 - b. Rev. Joshua Peck - 2nd vote (39/60)
 - c. Rev. Merle Hock - 3rd vote (35/58)
 - d. Rev. William Saxton - 5th vote (36/62)
 11. Rev. Daniel Shumway was elected to a 3 year term on the Board of Trustees, 1st vote (47/61)
 12. Rev. Jerry Lambeth was elected to a 3 year term on the Examining Board, 2nd vote (46/64)
 13. Rev. Daniel Shumway was elected to a 3 year term on the Examining Board, 5th vote (38/61)

CONFERENCE FINANCES

1 Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall maintain the following funds:

- 1) General Fund
- 2) Foreign Missions Fund
- 3) Ministerial Benevolence Fund
- 4) Pastoral Supplemental Income Fund
- 5) Church Extension Fund

Each church is urged to send all budget items to the Conference Treasurer each month (including all following information as currently stated in the Conference Minutes).

The General Fund shall be provided for by:

- 1) Pastors' tithes.
- 2) 50% of other Ministerial members' tithes.
- 3) \$2.00 per month per member.

This General Fund is for Conference expenses.

The Foreign Missions Fund is to be provided for by:

- 1) Monthly offerings by the local churches.
- 2) Self Denial offerings in November of each year.
- 3) Offerings at camps and Missionary Conventions.

Specified gifts shall be disbursed as directed by the donor. Unspecified monies shall be disbursed under the direction of the Conference Council.

The Ministerial Benevolence Fund shall be provided for as outlined in Appendix A of the Bylaws and shall be administered by the Conference Council.

The Pastoral Supplemental Income Fund shall be provided for and administered according to †Standing Resolution No. 16, pages 26-28, †1990 Conference Minutes. (†This is currently *Standing Resolution 20*.)

The Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by:

- 1) Easter offerings which shall be used for Church Extension activities. The Conference Council shall set a goal for each church for the Easter offering.
- 2) Special offerings for Church Extension activities may be taken at our camps and in the local churches.

2 Resolved, That the Conference President's support be as follows:

Salary: \$575.00 per week, travel expenses (meals, lodging, tips, fees) plus the use of an automobile which may take any or a combination of, at the discretion of the Council, the more economical/feasible of the following forms: rental, lease, purchase, or mileage reimbursement based on IRS allowance, and actual expense by any other means; in addition, the Conference shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water. Be it further

Resolved, That the Ways and Means Committee review the Conference President's salary annually. Be it further

Resolved, That in the event that the Conference President chooses to draw Social Security and notifies the Council in writing of his desires, his salary shall be adjusted to become the maximum amount allowed without penalty by the IRS. These changes be retroactive to January 1, 1986. Be it further

Resolved, That the Conference President be granted an annual vacation of three weeks each year with pay and freedom to conduct two revivals outside the Conference each Conference year, and he shall be permitted to keep proceeds from the same. Be it further

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — FINANCE (Continued)

Resolved, That the Conference President's Social Security assessment shall be paid from the Conference funds.

- 3 Resolved, That the Conference shall provide Health and Hospitalization Insurance for the Conference President and his dependents and the premiums shall be paid from the Conference funds.

- 4 Whereas the Conference President is encouraged by the Conference to call upon the Conference Vice-President or any other member of the Council to assist him, or serve in his place, as necessary and provided that his first consideration in this matter be the Vice-President whenever practical: Be it

Resolved, That the Council be authorized to provide anyone who so serves to represent or assist the President in his official duties with a per diem salary of \$20.00 plus expenses except that if the Vice-President or Conference Missionary Secretary is not serving a pastorate, the per diem salary shall be \$40.00.

Resolved, That the Conference Missionary Secretary be reimbursed for out of the pocket travel expenses incurred in Conference Missions activity (meals, lodging, tips, fees) plus mileage by automobile and actual expense by any other means.

Resolved, That the foregoing provisions be subject to the restriction that no pastor shall be asked to spend more than 15 days per Conference year in such a capacity, without the knowledge and expressed approval of his local board.

- 5 Resolved, That the following persons receive annually from the Conference General Fund the amount stipulated for services rendered: Conference treasurer — \$1,200.00, office editor — \$600.00, Conference secretary — \$800.00, Conference statistician — \$200.00, Conference auditor — \$100.00. Be it further

Resolved, That the Conference Missionary Secretary be granted a stipend of \$1,000.00 per year for services rendered under section 5.3.7.x as well as preparing a monthly newsletter and visiting Conference churches and camps. This stipend is to be provided for through the Conference Foreign Missionary Fund.

- 6 Resolved, That adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on all Conference property.

- 7 Resolved to establish a Financial Committee made up of the Conference Treasurer, and two other individuals appointed by the Conference President, one from the Board of Trustees, and one former Conference Treasurer. The purpose would be to advise the Conference Treasurer regarding Conference investments,

- a. to report to the Council quarterly,
- b. to examine the investments and
- c. to provide a safeguard to the Conference Treasurer.”

- 8 Resolved:

- a. That all Conference funds be placed in accounts, protected by government insurance, and/or instruments bearing an “investment grade” rating. If for some reason an investment is not rated, the issuing organization must carry an A rating or better.
- b. Be it further resolved that the Treasurer shall certify to the Council at least quarterly that all funds meet said criteria.
- c. Be it further resolved when rendering the Treasurer's report to the Conference he/she shall attest that all funds/investments comply with the criteria the Conference has set, as described above.
- d. Be it further resolved that the individual/firm performing the annual audit verify compliance.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — FINANCE (Continued)

- 9 Be it resolved that a waiver be implemented due to the current rate environment, that funds may be invested in the Wesleyan Investment Foundation, even though it does not meet the requirements enumerated in the Conference's investment policy.
- 10 Resolved that reimbursement for pulpit supply be given to the church which the Missionary Secretary pastors on the services he is absent on missions duty up to \$75 for morning services and up to \$125 for the day.
- 11 Be it resolved that there be a total financial accounting of the cost of the ministerial convention given at annual conference by either the Conference Treasurer or the Convention Coordinator. This includes separating all Conference Council and Convention from the total Ministerial Convention costs.

CONFERENCE AND CAMP FINANCE

- 12 Resolved, that those driving to work on our campgrounds or otherwise using their vehicle in the interests of the Conference shall receive 30 cents per mile up to 600 miles traveled per occasion. When required travel exceeds the above limit, it is anticipated individuals will avail themselves to more economical alternative arrangements/options (car rental, airfare, car pooling, etc.) where actual expenses will be reimbursed.
- 13 Resolved, That in the light of the fact that Christian Law Association does not charge for its services but depends on the donations of God's people, our Conference send an annual offering of \$300.00.

LOCAL CHURCH FINANCES

- 14 Resolved, That each local church reimburse its pastor and locally elected delegates for their actual and reasonable travel expenses (30 cents per mile by auto) in attending Annual Conference. Be it further
Resolved, That each local church pay that actual and reasonable travel, meal and lodging expenses of its pastor and spouse in attending the Conference Ministerial Convention.
- 15 Resolved, That in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5th. The Conference Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10th, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5th. All monies mailed after June 5th shall be entered in the following year.
- 16 Inasmuch as our pastors and evangelists have no pension plan provided, be it
Resolved, That we strongly urge that the churches of which they are members pay all or part of their Social Security assessment on their salary.
- 17 Resolved, That local churches of the Conference be encouraged to support the conservative holiness Bible schools and colleges with their finances and prayers.
- 18 Whereas, the pastors of a number of our churches are not presently covered by Social Security, and have no other retirement fund, be it
Resolved, That we strongly urge that the churches whose pastors are not presently covered by Social Security, pay the pastor an equal amount to what his Social Security based on ministerial income would be. This amount to be placed in an Internal Revenue Service approved retirement fund by the pastor.
- 19 Whereas ministers not pastoring Conference churches are to pay 50% of their ministerial tithe for the Conference general fund, be it resolved that it is recommended that the other 50% of their ministerial tithe be paid to the local church where they hold membership.

RECEIPTS

- 20 Resolved, That all donations by any individual in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) or more be received by all treasurers (churches, camps and Con-

ference) as required by the IRS. Each receipt MUST include the statement: “No goods or services have been provided in exchange for your contribution. The benefit to you consists solely of what the Internal Revenue Service considers intangible religious benefit.”

CONFERENCE AUDITORS

21 Whereas the present manual requires at least two and not more than four auditors (pages 47-48, section 5.4.4) be appointed by the Conference Council, Be it Resolved, That we recommend that the Conference Council appoint four auditors as follows:

- 1) One auditor for each of the four camp zones.
- 2) Each auditor to reside in their respective camp zones.
- 3) Two of the four auditors be appointed as Conference Auditors as well as being camp zone auditor. The duties of the Conference auditors are outlined in Discipline section 5.4.4.

The duties of the camp zone auditor would be as follows:

- 1) To audit the zone camp treasurer’s report for their zone.
- 2) To be available to audit local church financial records of any church in the zone who desires such services. Any remuneration for these services would be between the local church and zone auditors.

22 Proposal for Pastoral Supplemental Income, to the 1989 Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, Inc., from the Ways and Means Committee.

Inasmuch as the pastors of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, Inc. generally receive a minimum of Social Security benefits at the end of their years of service, and Inasmuch as the local churches within the Conference have generally not provided for any means of ongoing financial support to Conference pastors after their retirement, be it

Resolved, that a Pastoral Supplemental Income Fund be established by this Conference to provide ongoing financial support to qualifying ministers and their spouses. Benefits paid from this Fund are not intended to be the sole support of the individual, but to be a supplement to their income. The Conference Council shall have sole responsibility for the administration of the Fund.

A. ELIGIBILITY

The Pastoral Supplemental Income Fund is intended to pay benefits to those individuals who meet the following qualifications:

1. All ordained and licensed ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, Inc. at least 65 years of age, who have pastored a Conference church or a church within the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, or have held the position of Conference President, or have served as a Missionary on a Conference mission field, or have been a duly recognized Conference Evangelist, or have served in any combination of these positions for a minimum of 10 years.
2. All ordained and licensed ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, Inc. less than 65 years of age who qualify to receive Social Security benefits due to disability and who would otherwise qualify under A.1 except for the age requirement.
3. The unmarried, widowed spouse of those qualifying under A.1 or A.2 above, provided they are eligible for Social Security benefits, maintain their membership within the Conference, and have served the Conference with their spouse for at

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — FINANCE (Continued)

least the minimum qualifying number of years as indicated in A.1 above.

4. When calculating service time, an individual will receive credit for a year's service only after submission of a satisfactory Ministerial Report. *See the Minutes, number 23 on page 12, for details of a change to this item in 2013.*

B. BENEFITS

The Conference Council shall establish the amount to be paid to those qualified under Section A above and may change the amount of the benefits to be paid to the recipients at any time. Benefits are to be paid:

1. To the qualifying individual under A.1 above beginning the first month after the month in which the individual turns 65 and continues until the month he/she dies. (See exception.)
2. To the qualifying individual under A.2 above beginning the first month after the month in which the individual begins receiving Social Security benefits due to disability and continues until the month the individual discontinues receiving said disability benefits from Social Security or until the month of his/her death.
3. To the qualifying individual under A.3 above beginning the first month after the month in which the spouse dies or becomes ineligible (see exception) and continues until the month of their own death (see exception). Payments are to be made monthly according to the following formula:

Monthly benefit equals floor rate plus longevity amount

10 years service equals floor rate base

Each year of service thereafter × longevity rate = longevity amount

The Floor Rate and Longevity Rate shall be set by the Conference Council and may be adjusted or changed by them at any time. The Conference Council has the right to discontinue payments to all individuals if the balance in the fund is insufficient to pay benefits due. The Council shall review the rates annually and their decisions in this matter shall be final and binding upon all parties.

4. The Council may choose to designate the benefit as a housing allowance for licensed or ordained ministers or as a benevolence for widows.
5. EXCEPTION: A qualified participant becomes ineligible and payment is discontinued when, and as long as, any of the following conditions apply:
 - ◆ Individual is institutionalized and as a result realizes no personal benefit, or
 - ◆ Individual is disadvantaged in obtaining medical care, or
 - ◆ It necessitates the Conference enter into an arrangement to circumvent government policy, or
 - ◆ Benefit becomes illegal.

C. CONTRIBUTIONS

The Fund is to be perpetuated by an allocation from a monthly assessment from each Conference church in the amount of 2% of each church's total monthly offerings less offerings received for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministerial Benefit Fund, Revivals and Capital Improvements. The church's total monthly offerings does not include offerings received for the Sunday School, Youth, or Christian Day Schools.

The Fund may also receive gifts and bequests. (Discipline Appendix C.3) Special appeals may be made if there are insufficient funds from other sources to cover benefits.

D. ANNUAL REPORT

The Conference Treasurer shall provide a detailed financial report of this Fund to the Annual Conference after submitting the same to the Conference auditor (Discipline

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — FINANCE (Continued)

5.4.4) along with the supporting records. The Conference Treasurer shall provide periodic reports of the Fund to the Conference Council. All public reports shall respect and protect the privacy of individual recipients.

The Conference Treasurer's report shall include:

1. The number of individuals receiving PSI monthly benefits.
2. The dollar amounts used for the current formula of benefits (floor rate and longevity amount).
3. The number of future recipients anticipated.

E. REVISION/PHASEOUT

1. All current participants reaching 55 years in age by May 31, 2001 shall experience no change in the plan's present format (see exception).

EXCEPTION: All PSIF 55+ qualified individuals who have been serving under other entities while only maintaining their license with the Conference will be removed from further PSIF participation. However, they will be credited or paid \$100 per qualified service year. (Individuals desiring payout must declare within 60 days of Conference action.)

2. All other PSIF "qualified" participants less than 55 years in age and ministers pastoring Conference churches will receive \$100 credit to their 403b plan for each completed year of service.

F. MODIFICATIONS

Changes to these regulations may be adopted only in accordance with the procedures for Standing Resolutions. (Discipline 5.4.2, 5.6.2).

- 23 Proposal for Conference 403b Plan, to the 2001 Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of NY, Inc., from the Ways and Means Committee.

Inasmuch as there are recognized limitations with the Conference's Pastoral Supplemental Income Fund and a benefit instrument now exists in the marketplace that would provide enhanced options and flexibility for our ministers, be it

Resolved, That the Conference establish a 403b plan and assume the responsibility for its administration on behalf of Conference churches, pastors, and ministers.

A. ELIGIBILITY

All ordained and licensed ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York, Inc.

B. CONTRIBUTIONS

A 403b is a deferred income, self-directed retirement plan, thus, participants may contribute directly or monetary gifts may be remitted by other parties and/or entities on participant's behalf.

The Conference may distribute an allocated portion of the monthly (2%) contributions from Conference churches previously restricted to perpetuate the PSI Fund. In addition, the distribution may include monies specifically earmarked for this purpose or as a result of special appeals. However, the Conference shall limit its contributory portions to active pastors/missionaries in Conference churches/fields, and full-time Conference officials who have submitted a satisfactory Ministerial Report. *See the Minutes, item 23 on page 12, for details of a change in this resolution for 2013.*

Be it resolved that a minimum of 50% of all PSI revenues be allocated to 403b distribution.

C. PRIVACY

Any and all individual financial information shall remain confidential.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — GENERAL

CAMPS

- 1 Resolved, That Victory Grove Camp begin the last Thursday in June and Adirondack Camp begin on the second Friday after the close of Victory Grove Camp and Binghamton Camp begin on the first Friday of August.
- 2 Resolved, That there shall be a Zone Camp Board for each of the three camps. Each zone board shall be comprised of all the zone pastors with lay representation of two members appointed by the Council. The Council will also appoint a Camp Supervisor and Camp Treasurer. Be it further
Resolved, That Zone Camp Board, under the direction of the Council and Conference President shall be responsible for the material operations and maintenance of their camp. The camp boards shall be responsible for disciplinary regulations and enforcement. The basic rules for the camps shall be published in the Conference Minutes.
Resolved, That this Conference be informed that our ministers receive room and board at our zone camps as recompense for their labors throughout the year, work week and at their zone camp. Their meals are not free, but are tokens of appreciation for their unselfish labor on behalf of their respective camps.
- 3 Resolved, That we recommend all camp personnel be selected from the respective zones.
- 4 Resolved, That each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.
- 5 Resolved, That in view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of 10:30 o'clock and lights shall be out by 11:00 p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.
- 6 Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, be it
Resolved, That a contribution box for a free-will offering be properly marked and placed in our dining halls on Sunday.
- 7 Resolved, That a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further
Resolved, That bicycle riding on the camp grounds be prohibited during camp.
- 8 Resolved, That the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor or treasurer, (if known) of the churches concerned either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.
- 9 Resolved, That each Camp Board give serious consideration to the appointment of an additional person or persons to assist the treasurer in counting and recording all offerings.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- 10 Resolved, That the Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York, Inc., begin with a business meeting the first night. Conference Committees with business to do shall meet at 2:00 p.m. on the same day.
Resolved, That the Resolutions and the Ways and Means Committee be instructed to review annually all standing and annual Resolutions, relative to their designated business: Be it further
Resolved, That the Conference Secretary remind the respective committee secretaries of this responsibility within a reasonable time prior to the time set forth in resolution number 14, below.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — GENERAL (Continued)

- 11 Resolved, That the time of the Conference sessions be from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon; 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; and from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- 12 Resolved, That the two center sections of seats in the tabernacle constitute the Conference Bar.
- 13 Whereas, many conflicting schedules result from the pastors' lack of knowledge of the yearly Conference program, be it
Resolved, That the Conference Secretary formulate a yearly calendar including all the scheduled Conference and Zone events and activities, and that this calendar be spread in the Annual Conference Minutes.
- 14 Resolved, That the time of 2:00 p.m. on the first day of the Ministerial Convention be recommended to the Council as the latest date for committee meetings in accordance with page 52, Section 5.6.1 of the Discipline, and be it further
Resolved, That the Council be requested to publish a reminder in the Pilgrim News of the date they set at least two months prior to that date, in addition to the required notice in the Minutes.
- 15 Resolved, That a Conference Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the last full week of March, except when it falls on the week between Palm Sunday and Easter. It would then be held on the following week. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the Conference. The annual Conference vote will always be for the second Ministerial out.
- 16 Resolved, That the Conference President shall arrange for and promote bi-monthly Prayer and Fasting services to be participated in on a Conference-wide basis; the purpose of which will be to promote revival and unity in the Holy Spirit in these last days.
- 17 Resolved, That whenever possible the final reports of the legislative committees and all financial reports be distributed to the delegates and pastors in written form before being acted upon by the Annual Conference.
- 18 Resolved, That our young people be informed that the Conference Camp Rules are in effect during Conference.
- 19 Resolved, That those on the camp grounds during Conference who are not part of the Annual Conference are expected to help with necessary work. This includes adults and young people.
- 20 Resolved, That each church send \$1.00 per member offering for annual Conference expense. (This offering should be sent to the Conference Treasurer by June 10th.)
- 21 Resolved, That the Camp Treasurers' reports will not be formally presented for approval at Annual Conference. The reports are to be printed and made available at Conference, included in the Annual Minutes, formally presented at a Council meeting, and formally presented to a meeting of each respective camp board. Copies are also to be made available to the public at each zone camp. Auditor reports shall continue to be presented at Conference and the Conference Treasurer shall certify that the camp treasurers' reports have been presented to the Council.
- 22 Whereas the Conference is blessed to have several churches and fields of endeavor located outside the United States, be it
Resolved, That all financial reports shall be presented in US dollar denominations for the purpose of retaining consistency and clarity — any currency conversion shall be as of the date of the report.

CONFERENCE PUBLICATION

- 23 Resolved, That the Conference Publication shall contain in each issue a promotional space which highlights information and/or activities pertaining to the local Conference churches. Be it further

Resolved, That each church be urged to designate individual(s) to function as Public Relations Coordinator and/or Publications Coordinator and that there be timely submission of material to the Office Editor of the Conference Publication or to other designated individual(s).

- 24 Resolved, That the May issue of the Conference Publication be used each year as a means of informing and preparing our people regarding the business to be conducted at the Annual Conference, and to urge our people to give prayerful consideration to the same. The kinds of information to be provided would include nominations, reminders about proposed legislation, reports from the Council regarding any major program of the Conference, and a reminder of those Discipline sections with which all delegates should familiarize themselves prior to Conference. Be it further

Resolved, That the Conference President be given the responsibility to ensure that this directive is carried out.

- 25 Whereas it is essential and desirable to maintain the Conference publication “Pilgrim News” for communicational and promotional purposes, and, whereas continuing to underwrite the total costs thereof results in a considerable drain to the General Fund, be it

Resolved, That the distribution of the “Pilgrim News” be on a subscription basis. The Conference Council shall have sole responsibility for setting the subscription rate (or rates). Derived income shall not exceed related expenses.

LOCAL CHURCH

- 26 Resolved, That inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the Minutes.

- 27 Resolved, That we recommend each church grant their pastor two weeks vacation with pay for the first five years of labor in such church, and three weeks for five years or more. One Sunday is to be included with each week of vacation. However if a pastor has a total of at least 10 years pastoral experience, he shall be granted at least 3 weeks of vacation at any church he pastors and it is further recommended that a total pastoral experience of 20 years or more would be awarded 4 weeks vacation time.

- 28 Resolved, That each pastor be given the freedom to hold at least two revivals each Conference year.

- 29 Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York expects its members to respect the authority of duly constituted civil government and the majority of our members accept the responsibility of answering the call of their country to military service, and yet

Resolved, That this Conference lend its moral support to any of its members who request exemption from military service as a sincere conscientious objector, provided that he seeks such exemption by proper legal process and is willing to serve his country as a noncombatant.

- 30 Resolved, That the local church boards give serious consideration to the appointment of an additional person or persons to assist the treasurer in counting and recording all offerings and other income of the church and that such persons maintain a separate, accurate and complete record of all income for use in the annual audit of the treasurer's records.
- 31 Resolved, That a list of Lay Ministers be compiled from our local churches and such a list be inserted in the Conference Minutes.

PASTOR

- 34 Whereas our church secretaries should have on record all marriages, deaths, baptisms, dedications, and church memberships, be it
Resolved, That all pastors give this information within 30 days of such occasions and that each secretary and pastor maintain a permanent record of such information.
- 35 Inasmuch as the heavy burden of cleaning up our camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, be it
Resolved, That the preachers in each camp zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Adirondack Camp in the North, Victory Grove in the Central Zone and Binghamton Camp in the South.
- 36 Whereas, in the past, some pastors have not known or heard of the death of some ministers of the Conference, be it
Resolved, That the death of any Conference Minister or spouse shall be reported to each church and minister listed in the Minutes by the Conference President or his representative, preferably by phone.
- 37 Resolved, That when the Conference Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course, they may pay all or part of the cost of such a course. The Licensee in such a case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.
- 38 Resolved, That pocket credentials shall be issued annually to each licensed minister and every three years to ordained ministers in good standing.

STANDARDS

- 39 Resolved, That we, the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deploring the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

- 40 Resolved, That each Sunday School in the Conference close the Sunday School attendance records one-half hour after the beginning of the said school.
- 41 Whereas there is a need of adequate Bible-centered Sunday Schools, and it is our responsibility to reach the lost of our day with the message of salvation, be it
Resolved, That our Conference Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Conference Sunday School Board, be authorized to hold regional Sunday School Conventions

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — GENERAL (Continued)

and Teachers' meetings. These meetings would serve to explore, study, and share information on varied Sunday School literature presentations.

- 42 Resolved, That the last full week of September be designated as Sunday School Emphasis Week, and that the Sunday School Seminars, if at all possible, be held during that week, and that this date be added to the calendar in the back of the Minutes.

YOUTH

- 43 Resolved, That the location, date, and arrangements for the Conference Youth Rally be determined by the Conference Youth Committee and the arrangements be ready for announcement annually by May 31st.
- 44 Resolved, That the election of the Conference Youth Officers be held in the respective zones at the last Youth Rally before the Annual Conference. In the event there is a tie, the Conference President will cast the deciding vote.

Note: For additional information on Youth Organization, see Discipline Appendix E.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL

- 45 Resolved, That the Conference Council be authorized to explore the possibility of and make arrangements, if feasible, for the utilization of our Conference camps by other Holiness groups, providing that the local camp board approves the arrangement.
- 46 Resolved, That the Conference Missionary Secretary, in conjunction with the Conference Council and the local pastor, be directed to arrange annual deputational schedules to keep the work of both our Home and Foreign Missions before our people.
- 47 Whereas it is an objective of this Conference to achieve a full supply of pastors, missionaries, and other Conference-level personnel, be it Resolved, That the Conference President be authorized to establish a recruitment mechanism to promote the Conference at various Holiness Bible Colleges and other Holiness meeting places the Conference President deems beneficial. Such mechanism is to include the appointment of designated representatives from within the Conference body to visit these colleges on a regular basis. Visits will be for the purpose of promoting our Conference and contacting Conference young people at these schools to provide them with a sense of our appreciation and their belonging. This should be further emphasized to all interested students by giving them a subscription to the Pilgrim News, and that they be included in all appropriate Conference mailings.

ANNUAL RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas, the Lindsey Fund, to date, has been treated as an 'endowment fund' where only interest earned is available for use while the principle remains constant. And whereas, this limitation was imposed internally upon the receipt of the funds, and not an expressed restriction by the granters, be it Resolved, That an amount (consisting of interest earned and principle) equivalent to 7.5% of the prior year-end Fund's balance, with a \$10,000 minimum, be transferred each year to the Foreign Missions' account until the Fund is depleted.
2. Whereas most years the annual Outreach and Bus Convention and our Ministerial Convention take place during the same month, and many of our ministers, are bi-vocational. There is great difficulty in getting the time off and/or being able to afford to take the time off, Be it resolved that a one-time change be made in the Conference Calendar and in the year 2020 our Conference Ministerial Convention be cancelled

STANDING RESOLUTIONS — GENERAL (Continued)

and all our ministers be required to attend the annual Outreach and Bus Convention to be held in Lebanon, Pa. Our conference Ministerial Convention would then resume in March 2021.

3. Resolved, that the conference body would ratify the council decision on behalf of the New York Pilgrim Holiness Conference to work together with the God's Missionary Conference on a new church plant in Rome, NY and the authorization of a \$10,000.00 salary paid over the period of 10 months to the New York Pilgrim minister pastoring said church; Be it resolved that the conference actions are ratified by the conference body concerning the new joint effort church plant between the God's Missionary Conference and the New York Pilgrim Holiness Church and the salary to be paid to the minister of said church as long as the minister is a NY Pilgrim pastor for the time and amount agreed to previously by the Council under the condition of further explanation of current and future plans for said work.
4. "Resolved that the location, date, and arrangements for the Conference youth camp and mid-winter youth convention be determined by the Conference youth committee and announced annually."
5. Be it resolved that the Conference Council be authorized to take the following proposal to Christian legal counsel for guidance and referral to the Polity Committee in time to return an update to the next annual conference. "Consistent with the clear and repeated message of Scripture that God loves all people but abhors sin, we believe that hatred, malice, derogatory and demeaning conversation with or about any category of people is inconsistent with the attitudes Christ calls His followers to hold, as children of Light. We also believe that God calls all people to high and holy standards of righteous living, and that the church has a duty to clearly preach and teach and hold to Scriptural standards of conduct and character, however unpopular those principles may be in the prevailing secular culture. As Christian citizens of our nation, we should exercise the same rights and responsibilities as other citizens to vote, speak, assemble and associate with like minded persons in the interest of contributing to the moral and spiritual wellbeing of our American society in accordance with our Constitutional rights. With heartfelt Christian compassion and redemptive purpose, we should seek to befriend and reconcile to Christ all kinds of sinful people, and be a means of helping them find the kinds of remedial counseling, therapy, or other assistance needed to bring them to wholeness and fulfillment in Christ."

DISCIPLINE CHANGES

- 1 Appendix F, Section F.7 — The final question on page F10 shall be replaced with this new question: “Will you here and now pledge yourself to be loyal and obedient to the duly elected officers of the Conference as long as they act in harmony with the scriptures and the discipline of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of N.Y., Inc.?”
- 2 Appendix A, Section A.2 — Amended list item d) reads: If none of the above apply, then the benefit shall be paid to the estate of the deceased unless the distribution to the estate would result in it being totally assumed by a government agency or jurisdiction.
- 3 Discipline, Section 3.9.1. Modesty (p.18) — the phrase “or without stockings” is deleted.
- 4 Discipline, section 6.7.4 (p. 75), “Commissioning of ordained ministers,” the first sentence is changed to read, “After approval by the Annual Conference of a minister for ordination, the Council shall announce the time and place on which the ordination service will be held.”

EDITING CORRECTION

On Discipline page 18, Section 3.9.1. the Scripture reference Jeremiah 4:39 should read Jeremiah 4:30.

COUNCIL RULING CONCERNING TECHNOLOGY USE

In this day of scientific and electronic development, it is a fact that many of the films, videos, and computer software available today are totally anti-Christian and should have no place whatsoever in the homes and minds of Christians.

As members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York, we are to avoid anything that cannot be done to the “glory of God.” Establishing this principle as an absolute guide for our lives will undoubtedly rule out all misuse of modern technology.

Inasmuch as we are enjoined by God’s Word and our Church Covenant “to shun the paths of sin” and to walk in the way of righteousness and true holiness all the days of our lives, we are to only fill our minds with “whatsoever things are true. . . honest. . . just. . . pure. . . lovely. . . of good report; if there be any virtue. . . praise. . . think on these things.” Phil. 4:8

Therefore, we, the Conference Council feel it is important to issue a strong warning regarding the potential dangerous misuse and subtle evil of modern technology; including films, videos, and computer software.

On page 16 of our Discipline under Sec. 3.8 of the Church Covenant, members agree “to avoid singing those songs, or reading those books, or viewing those things which tend to lessen our love for God.”

We, the Conference Council, rule that this paragraph forbids the misuse of videos, VCR’s and computer software. We believe the usage of these modern technologies for worldly amusement purposes violates the traditional position of the Conference since it unnecessarily exposes our people to the subtle control of the enemy.

MISSIONARY SECRETARY'S REPORT

President Peabody, council, fellow pastors and ministers, delegates, and guests of the 97th annual conference: Greetings in the wonderful name of Jesus. "Give unto the Lord the glory due unto His name: bring an offering, and come before Him. Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." I Chronicles 6:29

Worship is not something we do; it is the way we live. Worship is not localized and limited to one's presence in church. God honoring worship is not turned on and off with the ringing of the church bell or the concluding 'amen' of the benediction. Worship that is worthy of the Lord comes from a heart yielded to the will of God; a life committed to pleasing the Lord. Worship is presenting all that we have and do as a sacrifice of praise and adoration to the only one worthy of all glory, honor, dominion, and power.

Haiti is a nation in turmoil today. News reports attempt to describe the chaos in the streets of Port-au-Prince. All travel to and from this capital city has been effectively halted. Our Christian brothers and pastors remain in their homes for safety. An instant message from a Facebook family member said it is about as bad as back in 2004. There is an urgent call for God's people to pray for divine intervention.

Our missionaries to Brazil are under attack by our common enemy, Satan. God has been moving in a marvelous way in the ministry of Bro. and Sis. Mills. Progress has been made on many fronts. Doors have opened for St. Joseph and a new ministry, the church plant in Manacaparu.

Bro. Mills has completed Bible studies on the 10 commandments in most of the churches. The Bible Institute now has a four year curriculum of classes. The Lord has enabled Bro. Mills to move forward in his goal to prepare the Brazilian council to assume more of the administrative responsibilities. All this has brought on an onslaught of satanic oppression and spirit of depression. The Mills' need to be covered with a blanket of prayer.

At this time, I believe it appropriate, even urgent that we as a body of believers come to the throne of Grace on behalf of God's work in Haiti and Brazil.

HAITI:

The missions committee met with Don Mobley on September 7, 2017, for the annual review of the work in Haiti and planning session for the year ahead. Bro. Mobley confirmed his intention to continue partnering with Pilgrim Missions in that as our field director for the coming year. He offers invaluable administrative assistance for the leadership team,

practical advice to our pastors in the day-to-day operations of our churches, and spiritual guidance to pastors and laity.

Two matters of ministry were discussed. There are now two seminary graduates that need to be integrated into active ministry. Felix Dieumattandre has interest in a teaching ministry. Bill Dawson Lucien's desire is to develop youth ministries in the local church. The second area involves medical missionary ministry. Chad and Stephanie Dewitt believe the Lord is leading them to get involved in short term ministry to the Haitian people.

Rev. Jonathan Fall accompanied the missionary secretary to Haiti in the annual visit this past March 20-26. Camp meeting services had begun the previous Sunday. The church at Saut d' Eau was full every night. This year's camp meeting theme was "Jesus is Ready to Return." The sermon for the 1st service we attended was "Preparing for Your Rendezvous with Jesus." It doesn't take a whole lot to get our Haitian people excited. Shouts of "Hallelujah" and "Glory to God" were frequently heard during the message. The Sunday morning crowd swelled to over 350 in the sanctuary with nearly 100 out in the courtyard. What an honor and blessing to worship with our Haitian people. On the morning of our departure, we visited with Elwood and Anita Martin. Sis. Marten is a doctor with a clinic about two hours travel southwest of Port-au Prince. Their clinic is a potential door for anyone led of the Lord toward medical missionary service. Don Mobley returned to the states shortly after this visit to Haiti.

Bro. Mobley remained in the states until the first of June. While there he was updated with reports from Pastor Roniald. In a phone call to Bro. Mobley, it was arranged for him to participate in the missionary service at Binghamton Camp on August 9. He plans to be back in the states during the month of August.

Thank the Lord; the message of holiness is very much alive among our Haitian churches. Praise the Lord for a leadership team that pulls together with their fellow pastors and laity to advance the Kingdom of Christ.

BRAZIL:

Bro. and Sis. Mills have one year remaining until their next furlough. It has been an incredible year for our missionaries in Manaus. One of Bro. Mills' goals for this third term is to move forward on integrating the leadership of the church into a greater role in the area of administration. The current executive council has taken on more of this responsibility than ever before. Another goal of his has been to develop their own personal ministry in Brazil. Their commitment to being sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit took on exciting dimensions in the last three months in Manaus.

A constant stream of seemingly disconnected achievements and circumstances began to emerge. When Bro. and Sis. Mills started connecting the "dots." They were filled with apprehension yet inward delight!

1. For the past year, Bro. and Sis. Mills have followed a three month pattern of focused ministry with individual churches. This allowed them to identify with the pastors and people areas of unique need and time to minister to those needs.
2. An in-depth Bible study on the Ten Commandments with each church brought into focus areas of personal spiritual struggles that, when overcome, yielded a spirit of revival in the church.
3. Bro. and Sis. Mills' pursuit of adopting a Brazilian child through a government agency brought them into contact with Jason and Andrea Murfitt, a couple from England who were also pursuing adoption. Little did they know that this friendship was God's way of directing them toward the next level of their ministry in Brazil.

MISSIONARY SECRETARY'S REPORT (Cont)

So, this is the rest of the story. A Facebook message from this couple asked the Mills' to pray that God would help them sell their mission compound. They needed to return to England. In a visit to their property in Manacaparu, Bro. and Sis. Mills began to sense the unmistakable conviction that this was a potential church plant ministry for the work in Manaus. The latest newsletter from the Mills' describes in greater detail all the providential events that led them to this area of Brazil. The Brazilian council called a general assembly and voted unanimously to purchase this property.

Such a major change, the Mills' will be moving to this new location, necessitates a considerable time of transition. There are many details and decisions yet to be worked out, but they and the Brazilian people are convinced that this is the new ministry/church plant envisioned when the Coroado church was sold and the money set aside until such a time as this. Please pray for Bro. and Sis. Mills and the Brazilian leaders that God will give them wisdom, unity of spirit, and daring faith to follow the will of God.

True to character, the devil is not taking this development lying down. There have been satanic accusations, physical altercations, and attempts to bring division, dissatisfaction, and disagreements. However, the devil is a defeated foe! Just this morning, Bro. Mills shared with me the blessing of God coming in their devotional time. The Scripture in Psalm 121 pointed them to the true source of help! The Lord which made heaven and earth. The words to the song "Hide Thou Me" express their prayer:

Sometimes I feel discouraged and I think my works in vain
I'm tempted oft(en) to murmur to grumble and complain
Ohh... But then I think of Jesus and all he's done for me
Then I cry Ohh... Rock of ages Hide thou me (Iris Dement)

The next visit to Brazil is planned for the latter part of August. Bro. and Sis. Mills hope to be moved to Manacaparu by the end of July. Please keep Bro. and Sis. Mills and the Brazilian people in your prayers.

WINNIPEG

Raymond and Mena Kurten remain at Winnipeg at this time. They continue to hold Sunday services for any who come to worship. The work here is in a holding pattern. The field remains whitened unto harvest. It is critical to the continuation for this ministry that we pray for Bro.
